Dingwall Cares: Anthony Nolan

Anthony Nolan is a charitable organisation that saves the lives of people who suffer from blood cancer and blood disorders. Last week an Anthony Nolan representative delivered a presentation to the senior pupils. They made us 6th years realise how incredibly easy it is to save the life of someone who has no other alternative. Given that Dingwall Academy has raised more money for Teenage Cancer Trust than any other school in the UK, the chance to give even more support with people with cancer presented itself as a great opportunity. Because of this it is no surprise that over 60 6th year students applied to be a life-saver. Alongside the impressive student turnout, many members of staff also put their name on the Anthony Nolan register.

We hear many horror stories about stem cell and bone marrow donation but the reality is so much simpler. After you merely spit in a tube and your tissue type is determined, you may be called up as you are the only match for someone who is in need of a stem cell donation. If this was to happen, you're asked to come down to an Anthony Nolan clinic. If you live far away, all expenses are paid. Once there you're connected to a machine and they extract the stem cells required. The process takes around four to five hours but once complete you are free to go home knowing that you've just potentially saved somebody's life.

All together our Spring Fair was a great success with lots of money made, happy customers and happy pupils and staff.



Prize Giving

Arrangements are now underway for the annual school Prize Giving. This year the event takes place on Wednesday 8th June and our guest speaker is former Rector Mr Graham MacKenzie. Teachers are currently selecting prize winners for all year groups.

In S1 and S2 the top pupil in each class for individual subjects receives the class prize. In S3 the top pupils for each subject in the year group receive distinctions. In the senior phase the top pupils being presented for National 5, Higher and Advanced Higher receive awards. There are also a number of special prizes awarded for a range of outstanding achievements.

The list of prize winners will be published at the start of May and all will be invited along with family to attend the event.



Biology Challenge



On March 21, fourteen S3 Biology pupils put themselves to the test and took part in the Royal Society of Biology's Biology Challenge. The competition is open to all 13-15 year olds (in Scotland S2-S3) pupils in UK secondary schools. Pupils have a limited time to answer 120 questions online and under exam conditions, covering nearly every Biology topic imaginable. Seven of our pupils earned an

award certificate, and many more were only a few points short, so well done to all who participated!

Ellie Taylor was our top scorer with a Silver Award, and just 1 point away from Gold. Finlay Rollo earned a Bronze Award, and Jessica Neilson and Jennifer Smith both earned Highly Commended Awards, just missing the Bronze by 1 point. This was the two girls' second year to participate. Hannah Georgeson also earned a Highly Commended Award, with Sara Nicoll and Eilidh MacKenzie earning Commended Awards. Pupil comments included

The aims of the Biology Challenge are to encourage an interest in biology beyond the school curriculum and stimulate curiosity in the natural world, and to involve as many pupils as possible in a challenging and interesting biology competition. It is a great opportunity for our S2 and S3 pupils to challenge themselves and to demonstrate their knowledge of Biology.
