Success!

The first week in August is always a nervous and exciting time as the SQA exam results arrive. This year was arguably even more nerve wracking than usual as we awaited the first results of the new National Qualifications. S4 pupils have all experienced the new exam system, with National 3 and National 4 levels being assessed internally, and pupils sitting National 5 examinations being presented for external exams.

We were very pleased with the overall S4 results, with 76 pupils achieving at least 5 passes at National 5 level. As a result of the changes it is very difficult to make comparisons with previous years, but there were some outstanding performances. A high number of pupils achieved A and B passes in all their National 5 subjects. The following pupils achieved A passes in all 7 of their National 5 subjects:

Summer School

P7 - S1 Transition Summer Activities

The P7 – S1 Transition activities took place between 15th and 17th July. The project ran for three days this year instead of the usual five days, mainly due to available resources and the additional activities being run to celebrate the Commonwealth Games. However, there was no reduction in quality or fun.

One hundred and seventeen pupils booked on to the project and on each day we always welcomed around 106 boys and girls. The variety of opportunities this year included some different activities and the adult staff had bated breath, wondering how they would be received by the youngsters. We were pleasantly surprised that the singing and the dancing all went down really well, especially with the boys. Cricket and Frisbee were also new to the programme and again, lots of fun was had by everyone.

A rather nice highlight of the week came from the Art workshops. As the Art rooms weren't available, we had to use another area in the school and therefore deliver a 'clean' session. Mr Houston, the art teacher who kindly helps us out every year, suggested making postcards. We agreed this would be fine but to give it more of a purpose, I suggested that we send the postcards to an orphanage in South Africa with whom I have a connection. The boys and girls took this on board and set about making their postcards with Scottish themes, Commonwealth Games themes and much more. They wrote to a child or young person on the back giving them news about their lives here in Dingwall. What they wrote was incredible and from the little information they had been given about the orphanage they seemed to understand fully why they were doing this. The cards were posted after the event and a Facebook message came back





All in all, the three days were most successful with no hitches, problems or difficulties. A happy atmosphere was throughout the school the whole time.

The project gained by having a group of senior pupils working with us for the three days. They were a great asset as they took on responsibility for managing the groups of children at each workshop and joined in with the activities, which has created a bond between senior pupils and the new \$1 classes.

As this was my first year of running this project, and was a bit nervous about how it would go, I would like to thank the following people for keeping me right - Childrens Services Workers, Youth Development staff, Library Staff, Active Schools colleagues, Stephanie Watson and Sarah Peebles - volunteers who had been Dingwall Academy pupils recently, Mr Brindle, Mr Houston, external activity providers, the senior pupils and the parents for bringing their children along every day and recognising the benefit that all the hard work of the HLH staff can bring.

Romania Expedition 2014

There you have a brief summary of our fifth year expedition to Romania this summer.

These 'minor hiccups' aside, our eventful ten day visit to Romania was nothing short of amazing. From the minute we landed in Bucharest we were

struck by the friendliness of the locals, but it wasn't until we reached the city of Brasov (picture the Inverness of Romania) that our journey really began. From there we only had a short train journey to Rasnov, where we volunteered for four days with the Bethany Foundation, a charity who help disadvantaged Roma children gain an education. There were over 20 children with us at the project every day, always greeting us with the excitement that most would reserve for the day they meet Beyoncé (because trust me, there will come a day). What surprised us the most was how eager they were to learn; having spent the year in Dingwall complaining about Highers we were suddenly reminded just how fortunate we are.

At the close of our four days teaching the children we couldn't help but feel that they had taught us more than we could possibly teach them. With the typical clichéd heavy heart we continued on the next part of our expedition, an epic climb up the Piatre Mare, a mountain over 1800 feet. The view from the summit more than made up for the aching bones that followed our topping the mountain in a matter of hours, another highlight being our wake-up call from a group of donkeys who decided to ambush our camp at 7am (who needs an alarm clock!?).

Our return to the chaos of Bucharest only served as a reminder of how close we were to going home but didn't stop us from enjoying the city sights and more importantly, the food! Determined to stay in touch with our kind hosts at the charity project we all plan to return next summer – this time to run a summer camp for the children. So yes, you might hear about a few more fundraisers before then...

Eden Court—Lord of the Flies

From the reviewer's desk: Lord of the Flies Dance Production

This production was based on the William Golding novel, published in 1954. The novel tells the tale of a group of private school boys whose plane is shot down over a desert Island. The boys are left to their own devices with no adults or order. It's an equally horrifying and enthralling piece of literature which depicts the slow mutilation of humanity in a situation where morality and civilisation is an afterthought. Replaced by the savage need for survival and the primal urge for

blood, it's a world where the strong prey on the weak and cruel and violent displays are looked upon with pride. Some of the boys lose their minds, some relish in the brutality and others join the masses just to get enough food. In the end only two remain separate from the rest of the group, Piggy and Ralph. The story escalates in intensity and comes to a climatic ending, allowing you to fully appreciate what has happened to these boys.

The production was put on by "New Adventures" a renowned dance company and was directed and choreographed by Mathew Bourne. Bourne took an interesting twist on the set of the story, replacing the Island with an abandoned theatre. It was an intriguing concept, however it was poorly explained and confusing as he had also included the lights to give impressions of the time of day and at one point had a huge sun dangle from the rafters. He also included the iconic hunting scene, where the boys hunted a sow. The two different notions struggled to merge.

Bourne was not the only brain behind the choreography; many of the Dancers also incorporated their ideas into the production, allowing for an interesting mix of movement and dance sequences. A big appeal factor with this production was the fact that the performers were a healthy mix of professionals and local boys who showed an interest in dancing and creativity. Yet while watching it you had no idea who was professional or who went to school down the road.

The entire performance was loaded with energy, the stage filled with bustling bodies jumping around creating a feeling of chaos. This madness was aided by the Soundtrack, composed by Terry Davies. It was loud and vibrant, thumping drums and screaming trumpets, occasionally backed with sinister chanting was very effective in conveying the tone of the scene. This again went hand in hand with the lighting. The Lighting was designed by Chris Davey and was used to maximum potential. The colours and style conveyed the mood of the scene in ways movement alone couldn't.

Overall this production is unique and provides a thought provoking experience. It's highly entertaining and is rich in symbolism, capturing Golding's main themes. It gets you to renew your views on the original work and was executed beautifully live.

School Trips

Athletes Shine on the Track for Dingwall

Over the course of the athletics season Dingwall Academy athletes showed that they have the talent, determination and attitude to achieve at the highest level on the track. Athletes from the school attended three competitions of varying standards and managed to do extremely well at all three. Personal bests were regularly smashed, medals were won by the bucket load and records were broken left, right and centre!!!

Ross and Sutherland Schools

The most local of these events was the Ross and Sutherland Schools Athletics Championships. The school travelled with a 50 plus strong team and aimed to win as many individual gold medals and overall age group championships as was possible – the team did not disappoint!! The team won 32 gold medals in total, the pick of these being **Andrew Smith's (S6)** run in the senior boys 200m where he broke the record running 22.65 seconds. There were also great overall performances from **Jessica Golden (S2)**, **Nicola Ramsay (S2)** and **Eilidh Gunn (S4)** who all came away with three individual gold medals each. Unfortunately, not every pupils was able to win a gold medal, however, every Dingwall athlete contributed greatly to the team points total for each age group and should be proud of their performance.

The overall age group trophies were won U14 girls and U15 girls with the senior girls finishing second in their age group. Although all the boys teams were disappointed not to finish in the top two of their team events, all pupils contributed to winning the overall points total beating Tain RA into second place by 10 points.

North of Scotland Schools

The North Schools event is a tougher nut to crack as it includes schools from Shetland in the North, to Kingussie in the South and Fochabers in the East. However, despite this the team still managed to win 8 gold, 8 silver and 7 bronze medals on the day – a superb haul! **Lauren Fraser (S5)** was impressive in her 1500m U17 girls race where she not only took the gold medal but set a new championship best performance of 4min 56secs. There were also numerous personal best performances over the course of the day with all pupils performing particularly well.

Scottish Schools Athletics Championships

With championships being held at Hampden, with the newly laid track for the Commonwealth games, there was a lot of excitement and nerves amongst the athletes for this competition. Only the best from across Scotland can compete at the championships and Dingwall sent a small but strong squad of athletes to ply their trade against the best.

Both **Scott MacDonald** and **Joe Arnaud (S3)** competed in the U15 boys 800m which meant they had a lot of travelling to do as they had to qualify at a separate event held two weeks before the main event. Joe managed to win his heat and qualified for the final but unfortunately Scott was unable to qualify but did run an excellent PB at the championships. In the U15 boys 800m final itself Joe ran a hugely impressive race and finished in the bronze medal position with a time of 2min 05.4secs, that was not only a huge PB but also smashed the school S2 boys record. On the weekend itself both **Lauren Fraser (S5)** and **Luke Shaw (S6)** competed in the U17 1500m. Both qualified for their respective finals and both finished and impressive 6th with Luke achieving an impressive personal best time of 4mins 10.43secs. Last up was **Andrew Smith** who has been steadily improving his times over the courses of the season. He competed in both the 400m on the Friday and the 200m on the Saturday. Not only did Andrew manage to qualify for both his finals he won the bronze medal in both races. This was a great achievement for Andrew who although narrowly missed out on individual selection for Scotland, did get selected to compete for Scotland in the relay at the British Schools championships to receive his first Scottish cap.

Andrew Smith (S6) also recently competed in the 400m at the Scottish Senior Athletics Championships. This was a big step up for Andrew as he was competing in the Men's section. However, this did not seem to faze Andrew who won a silver medal and achieved a massive personal best and a blistering time of 49.2 seconds.

Huge congratulations to all the Dingwall Academy athletes who competed in any of the athletics competitions this year. Quite a simply a very impressive group of pupils who are not only athletically talented but were an absolute credit to themselves and the school in the way they conducted themselves throughout. Well done team!!





DiGGers Sunflower Competition



- 1. Be a sixth-year pupil studying at or beyond Higher level
- 2. Be an emotionally mature team player
- Commit to all four aspects of the course, including the communication of the lessons you have learned to the wider school community on your return
- 4. Be able to attend seminars in Glasgow and the trip to Poland as detailed in the sidebar
- 5. Submit an essay of no more than 500 words, discussing the importance of remembering the Holocaust, to Mr Green by 2pm on Friday 5th September.



Speech Sucks: the Future Signs!

BSL FRINGE TRIP 6TH AUGUST 2014

After a successful training event earlier in the term, with Professor Graham Turner from Heriot Watt University, an invitation was sent inviting BSL pupils to attend one of the Fringe events in Edinburgh. But it would be during the school holidays. However, ten pupils, Mary Whittaker and her hearing dog, Scott and Mrs Kinsman woke early and travelled to Edinburgh to experience another opportunity to challenge their BSL skills and Deaf awareness.

The Fringe show called 'Speech sucks; the Future Signs was part of the Cabaret of Dangerous Ideas festival programme, where experts raise serious issues in unusual ways.

Unlike previous events where the pupils had to use their sign language skills to follow and understand the proceedings, the pupils had the opportunity to see professional sign language interpreters work alongside the presenters; Professor Turner and Assistant Professor Gary Quinn, as they translated BSL into spoken English and spoken English into BSL and with accuracy not just in the choice of words used but also to reflect attitude and intent from the speakers; sometimes at a flying pace!

They also experienced different aspects to deaf culture which many of them had read about but had never actually experienced. So silent heckling through raised hands waving and gesturing wildly showed that Deaf people can vent their feelings as well as any hearing person but just in a different way. Deaf humour, sarcasm and regional variations in signing styles all appeared in this unique presentation.

Audience participation was welcomed and encouraged but unfortunately just as the pupils were feeling confident to go up to the front (and in front of over 100 deaf and hearing people) and join in this lively tongue in cheek debate the compere announced the time was up... next time they will be ready!

The show was fast, it was serious, it was funny, it was engaging and above all it showed Deaf and hearing people engaging in a lively debate about BSL but with wit, humour and above all a true sense of fun. When one of the microphones stopped working, this failure was soon pounced on by a member of the audience when she rightly pointed out that if you sign you don't need to rely on the electronic gadgets which can fail at any moment!

After the show, the pupils were interviewed by a reporter from TESS about their BSL studies and lack of parity they felt their qualification had with other National qualifications.

Then it was a quick walk back to the station to catch the train home.

As in previous events the pupil were praised for their interest, commitment and behaviour.
