21st Century Classroom



Parents may have noticed their child making use of Google Classroom. This is an app that allows teachers to share teaching materials and to set questions and assignments electronically.

Pupils have been provided with a google email address that allows access to Google Apps for Education and ensures that all communications are highly secure.

As previously intimated, all Highland Council pupils will eventually receive a portable Chromebook device. However, pupils can already download and make use of Google Classroom on any device at home. Simply go to the App store and search for Google Classroom, the App is free.

We do appreciate that some pupils may not have access to a device, or may not have internet connection at home. If you are concerned that your child may not be able to access Google Classroom then please contact the school where we will be happy to discuss possible solutions.

SQA/UCAS

This is a very important term for senior phase pupils with the SQA exams now only weeks away. Parents and pupils are reminded that before pupils can sit the final exams they must have completed and passed any internal assessments. Unfortunately a number of pupils do not yet seem to appreciate the importance of this and are taking too casual an approach to internal assessments and coursework.

SQA policy is very clear – without completing the internal coursework and assessments a pupil cannot gain an overall award in that subject. Pupil Voices: Malawi



In S3 Modern Studies, we have been studying Malawi. It is a beautiful country with safari parks, lakes and many tourist attractions. Unfortunately, Malawi is one of the poorest countries in the world. Most children in Malawi are very vulnerable and suffer from numerous diseases, poverty and poor education.

As a class, we decided to raise money to help

these children. Between donations from pupils and Miss Welsh, we have managed to raise £50. We are donating the money to Open Arms Malawi. This is a charity that helps orphans from when they are born until they are adults. With the money we have raised, we are able to buy a 1 month supply of protein supplement, a mosquito net (because Malaria is a big killer in Malawi), enough food to feed a child for a month and an annual medical bill for a child.

Bursary Applications



The Highlands and Islands Educational Trust is governed by the Education (Scotland) Act 1962 and the Highlands and Islands Educational Trust Scheme 1969. Each year the Governors of the Trust award bursaries to pupils who are living in the Highlands and Islands area and who are about to embark on courses of Higher or Further Education.

Bursaries are awarded on academic merit and are judged primarily on the results of SQA examinations e.g. all successful applicants in 2015 had obtained 5 Highers at A grade in fifth year. A specific award may be made to candidates who are speakers and/or students of Gaelic. Application forms are available from the school website.

Scottish Sensory Awards 2015



On Monday the 15th February, 6 pupils joined Ms MacCallum, Ms Pendelbury and Mrs Kinsman at Inverness train station to travel to Stirling to represent the school at the Scottish Sensory Awards. (the pupils were: DJ Cameron, Lara Horne, Holly Spittal, Lucy Taylor, Rory Cormack and Rachel Johnstone). The school had been shortlisted for 3 awards: Transition DVD for deaf pupils, S1 IDL Deaf Awareness and Staff Sign Class 2015.

At the ceremony, held in the Stirling Court hotel, in the Stirling University campus, we met many people all offering congratulations to the school. We also met some deaf blind people who used deaf blind manual, or hands on signing. This was the first time some of us saw this way to communicate. It looked really tricky but Mrs Kinsman told us that it gets easier when you do it all the time.

Angela Bonomy from the Scottish government presented the awards.

She told the audience something about each nomination before announcing the winners. The winners and runners up came from all over Scotland and from many different organisations.

Miss MacCallum, Miss Pendelbury and Holly went up to receive the runner up certificate for the Staff Sign Class for category 3: personal and workforce. The judge told us that it was really great to hear that not only do the pupils get the chance to learn to sign but the teachers do as well!

Then she moved on to announcing the category 4 winner: Engaging people with a sensory loss. It was amazing to hear her say Dingwall Academy had won with their Transition DVD for deaf pupils leaving primary to come to the academy. DJ, Lara and Mrs Kinsman received the award.

It was great when she then told the audience that we had achieved second place as well for the IDL Deaf Awareness course. Rachel, Rory, Lucy and Mrs Kinsman went up to receive the runner up certificate.

The certificates are really interesting because they are made for blind people so there are raised markers around the certificate to show the edging and the right way up, raised letters, braille and Moon. No-one had seen certificates like these before.

We had a little time to have a look around the shopping centre near the station to get something to eat before we had to catch the train back to Inverness. The teachers looked after the trophy, the certificates and the gold star balloons.

We didn't mind giving up a day of the holiday because we felt proud to represent the school and we saw some really fascinating things like the guide dogs, the sign interpreters and the 2 ladies who typed everything onto a large screen.
