Exam Information

School closes for Easter on Wednesday 28th March. When school returns on Monday 16th April there will only be two weeks until the start of the SQA exams.

EXAMS START TUESDAY 1ST MAY

Entry levels for pupils are in the process of being confirmed. Pupils will then be asked to complete a data check, before being issued with personal exam timetables prior to the Easter break.

All senior phase pupils should now have an established study routine.

If pupils do not yet have an established study routine then they need to talk this through at home now. It is too late to wait until Easter or study leave to start the revision work. Think of it like saving money, if you start to save small amounts now it will all build up.

Parents of all S4 pupils were recently sent a study skills check list to work through at home.

Chrome books

Well the Chrome Books have arrived and have now been issued to all year groups!

We still have a few issues to address, but in general the roll out of devices has gone well. There are a few areas of the school where the wifi connection is not yet strong enough, this has been reported and should be rectified soon.

We are reviewing and revising our protocol as things progress. Unfortunately there will be a number of pupils who choose to make inappropriate use of their Chrome Books. Where this happens, pupils will have the device removed for a specified number of days and parents will be informed. However, we are pleased to report that the majority of pupils are using their devices very responsibly and seem genuinely excited by their arrival.

So, what are the Chrome Books being used for?

We asked some pupils to explain how the Chrome Book have been used in class.

"I use it to link up with my on line tutor for my distance learning tutorial." S4 pupil

"We used it in Maths to look at Manga High, it was useful for helping to explain things." S1 Pupil

"We used it in Chemistry to research the properties of metals." S4 pupil

"We used it in House Tutor to help us research materials needed for our stall at the Spring Fair." S2 pupil

Dingwall Academy at The Strathpuffer

Another year, another "Puffer" but this one was an absolute cracker!

With freezing temperatures and a full covering of snow in the week before the event, one thing was for sure! This year the Puffer would indeed live up to it's reputation of being one of the toughest bike races in the world.

Two teams from Dingwall Academy had spent months preparing for the event.

<u>Girls Quad:</u> This was the first time any school had entered an all-girls quad team. This decision was made and taken on willingly by four 13/14 year old girls Rowan Masterson, Emilia Astill-Brown, Bethany McCully and Lilly-Belle Kelt.





Due to the girls' age they required chaperones to ride the course with them and that's when the opportunity arose for the girls to ride from The Adventure Syndicate pit accompanied by Lee Craigie and Jenny Graham who have both had previous success in the Strathpuffer. The girls worked hard with their training and preparation and successfully completed their target of 4 laps each and 16 laps in total winning them the Youth Achievement Award for the event. As an extra bonus Lee and Jenny also won the female pairs category due to the number of laps they completed escorting the girls. Success all-round and fantastic achievements by all!

<u>Team of 8:</u> Callum Porter, Andrew Georgeson, Alexander Taylor, Aiden Forrest, Alasdair Reid, Quin Simpson, Rory Graham and Sean Kelt, ably assisted by Colin Morrison (Mechanic and chaperone for younger riders) Blair Cowan (Mechanic) and Fin Graham (Chaperone for younger riders) and a very willing army of parents/relatives/friends and siblings.

The eight boys were out to put right last year's second place to Fortrose Academy in the Schools category of the race, whilst the four girls were set to become the youngest all-female team of four to ever take part in the event and also the first ever all-girls team from a school. The boys, all from the school's mountain bike club, made sure bikes were fully serviced and most were fitted with ice "spiker" tyres. The pit area was set up on the Friday and new Gazebos that were provided by the school quickly began to feel like home – and a welcome retreat from the plunging temperatures.






The boys got off to a good start and slowly began to pull a gap on the other teams in the schools category. This continued through all 8 riders and by the end of the 8th lap, the team had about a half hour lead.

By 3am, Dingwall were on the verge of lapping their rivals when disaster struck. The -10 temperature took it's toll on one of the bikes which meant the rider had to return to the pits. The next bike also developed a problem with components beginning to freeze up. Finally back out on the lap around 40 minutes was lost altogether bringing Fortrose to within about 15 minutes of Dingwall.

After all the hard work and lack of sleep, heads could have gone down and the race could have been lost. Not with this lot! They talked to each other, and reassured each other that they had done it once and could therefore do it again. "We'll just have to build our lead again" from one of the riders followed with a collective agreement.

By the end of the race – and many more hours of darkness and sub-zero temperatures – the boys had once again put a lap between themselves and the competition for a resounding and well-earned win. Not only that but they finished 23rd overall out of hundreds of entrants.





This year, we once again had incredible support from the local community, for which we are truly grateful. For the third year running we were very grateful for the support from Frank Nicol Farm and Garden Machinery Ltd with the use of their awesome generator to keep the lights on in the pits and the riders' lights – and phones – charging. Also to George Cockburn and Son Butcher for a mountain of bacon and haggis to get us all through the night and Tesco's for other groceries to keep us all well fed. This year the school agreed to finance two new gazebos, which are essential to providing a cosy pit area where riders can recover and relax when not riding. The problem we had was, having found the best Gazebo's out there and agreeing a good deal, every courier company wanted around £75 to deliver them up to our IV post code - step up JBT Distribution who happily collected them from the Midlands and delivered them to the Academy free of charge! Heroes! This year Serimax (Evanton) gave a very welcome donation, which helped to cover some of the costs of competing at the event. Finally Orange Fox Bikes have supported a number of Dingwall Academy's bike related activities. This one saw a massive effort from Mark in setting up the pits for the girls and servicing every bike lap after lap throughout the entire event. Massive thanks to all of

Here is an account from Adam.

I recently took part in a mock interview that was organised by Bòrd na Gàidhlig. The interview was held in Inverness at Great Glen House where Bòrd na Gaidhlig are based. The event aimed to give pupils like myself an experience of a real life interview and also an insight into what it would be like to work for a group such as Bòrd na Gàidhlig and the sort of environment I would potentially be working in. The interview was chaired by David Boag, Director of Language Planning and Community developments and Cairistiona Christe, Early-Years Education Officer. They interview took place in a small board room and was conducted in a professional manner as if it were an actual interview. After the interview was completed I was given feedback on how I handled the interview and what I could do better. I found this experience to be very helpful as it allowed me to experience the process of an interview. It also allowed me to find out what employers are looking for in an applicant's interview. The feedback I received was really helpful. It has given me confidence in an interview situation and an understanding of interview techniques which will help me in the future.

"Good morning?"

A normal conversation in any café but what made this conversation unusual was it was all carried out in BSL. Some of the young people working in the Sunflower Café are BSL users, others are also BSL learners. S1 BSL classes set the bar high with some very impressive attempts at real life conversation using BSL. S2 and S3 BSL classes soon followed, again showing their conversation skills, easily conversing using their BSL skills.

S4 and Senior BSL classes also paid a visit and were able to demonstrate longer and more detailed conversations.

Several young people remarked that being able to sign could be useful if they worked in café or a shop. They also recognised that Deaf BSL users can go out and about and with enjoy a cuppa and chat with their friends.

The senior class discussed the benefits, BSL can have on the local economy: employment opportunities for Deaf people and those who can sign and the positive attitude to diversity in society.
