Adult Literacy

For this first time this year, a group of S6 pupils completed the Supporting Adult Literacy unit in partnership with Highlife Highland. The pupils learnt about issues impacting on adult literacy and strategies to improve adult literacy. The group then went on to tutor over 16s for a number of sessions. Next year this project will be extended and S6 Literacy Ambassadors will be trained to support a range of ages both in and out with the school setting.



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WW1 Memorial Trip of the battle of Arras

During the Easter break two 3rd years girls Lily Fraser and Ellie Ferguson Took part in an organised visit as part of the Arras Commemorations. Lily describes the experience,

This trip was truly the most eye opening experience that has ever occurred to us. It really shows the hardships and awful experiences the soldiers of WW1 went through. To start off



with we had to make our way to France so we left on a bus from Inverness at 6:30 and headed down to Hull on the ferry to Belgium.

The next day when we had reached Belgium we got off the boat and made our way to France where we would go and see the battlefields and graves of the Somme. The first stop was a massive crater that had been made by British soldiers trying to blow up the German trenches using 30,000kg of explosive. Next we went to the Thiepval memorial where the names of 72,000 British and South African soldiers are carved. Then we went to Newfoundland Park where the 29th Newfoundland division fought, that is a Canadian regiment, nearly all of them were wiped out. At this site there were visible trenches everywhere.

On the second day it was the actual 100 year anniversary of the battle of Arras and early in the morning we had to go to the memorial service. At the service some people talked, some read poems, we sang hymns and a brass band and some pipers played. As part of the ceremony all three battalions walked to two lines of graves and we all had to lay a poppy cross on one of the gravestones. After the memorial service we went to a German cemetery called Neuville St.Vaast which was very different from the British cemeteries. The German headstones were just plain, black crosses with 4 bodies per cross. This cemetery had 44,833 soldiers buried and had many mass graves with 7-29 soldiers in them. We then travelled to the French National Cemetery where 40,000 individual graves were. This was very upsetting to see as there were so so many headstones. The cemetery has bodies of French soldiers that fought in the war from a 30 mile radius. Also right beside the French National Cemetery was the Ring of Remembrance, this has the names of everyone who was killed in the north of France in the war, they are all from different countries and are not separated in anyway, all together there are 758,000 names on this ring. Then we went to the underground tunnels the soldiers stayed in while preparing for the battle of Arras. After that we went to the celebration in Arras town centre, lots of bands played and also we got to meet and take photos with the First Minister.

On the last day in Belgium and France we went to Porpopelle Cemetery where there are roughly 6,800 unknown soldiers buried. Our tour guide made us choose a headstone which was an unknown soldiers and place a poppy on it so they could be our soldier, this was for a very good reason which does not come until a little bit later. We then went to Passchaendaele Ridge where another regiment of Canadian soldiers fought, it is one of the highest points in that area. We then went to Tyne Cot Cemetery which is the biggest British WW1 cemetery in the world. It has the names of 35,000 British soldiers on the walls. In this cemetery we had to find a name for our unknown soldier and their regiment so we could name our soldiers. We then headed back to Porpopelle Cemetery where we had our own memorial service. We went back to our soldiers grave now with a name and a regiment and held a minute of silence, then we placed a poppy wreath on the main stone at the front. We then went to Ypres and to the Menin Gate which was very impressive. We then made our way to the ferry and stayed on that over night and came home the next day.

The overall experience was amazing for us and we are truly grateful for getting the chance to go. The trip was emotional, heartwarming and really opened our eyes, it is really important to remember those who came before and what sacrifices they made for us. On this trip we have made close friends and memories for life.
