Tanzania - World Challenge



On the 21st of June, five S5/6 pupils – Christy Eaglesham, Kelsie Nairn, Rachael Turner, Hannah Kerr and Alan MacKenzie – along with 4 pupils from Peterhead Academy, embarked on a month long adventure to Southern Tanzania with charity organisation, World Challenge.

The team embarked on a 2 year fundraising campaign before the expedition which not only helped fund the cost of their expedition but taught them valuable skills that would be essential on the trip, such as budgeting, organisation and teamwork. Two of the team members, Hannah and Kelsie have agreed to give us an insight into their experience. Hannah says,

"The thought of going away for a whole month, away from friends and family is daunting. It just seemed such a long time to be away but once your Expedition starts, it goes so, so quickly!"

After a very long journey via a long stay at Addis Ababa airport in Ethiopia, the team arrived in Dar Es Salaam for their Acclimatisation Week. Hannah adds, "It was a huge culture shock arriving in Dar Es Salaam. It was so noisy and so busy. Everything was moving so fast and everyone shouting in different languages. It took us some time to calm down and get used to the bustle." The next morning, the group would travel to Msosa at the edge of the Udzungwa Mountains. For two days the team trekked through Baobab Valley to experience traditional Tanzanian landscapes and meet locals while passing through the villages. The group had to get across the croc-infested river in a traditional dug-out canoe. An experience Hannah won't forget, "I swear, there was part of a leg in that river. I saw a shoe then 'something' attached." The rest of the team maintain that Hannah was perhaps still a little jet-lagged and/ or delusional!!

Part of the challenge is for the team to be able to source food, prepare and cook themselves. So, off to the

market they went and with the help of the local guides, were able to find and haggle the best price for their ingredients. Included in the shopping list were two live chickens. And yes, the team would have to prepare the chickens themselves! A very brave Kelsie agreed to complete the task. The team then learned to cook traditional Tanzanian food over an open fire. She said, "cooking for ourselves was really difficult. We had no clue how to start a fire! I've kind of supressed the whole chicken experience!!"

For the second week, the team travelled to Iringa for their Project Phase. World Challenge





send several teams to development projects such as schools or public buildings that are in the process of being built, thanks in part donations from charities such as this one. team arrived at Luhota Secondary School where they would be staying and painting a new laboratory. science Kelsie said, "Working in the school was really hard work but great fun.

It was great to see how grateful all the children and their teachers were, just from us doing something as simple as painting a building for them." While it was very hard work, there was always time to play with the school children. A Ceilidh of course, was in order!

Week three was the "Trek Phase" and the one most of the team dreaded the most! After two weeks of a limited diet and little sleep, the thought of climbing a mountain was enough to make them weep! Hannah added, "I was really looking forward to the trek but the general vibe seemed to be everyone wanted to cry!" The Challenge was to climb Mount Rungwe. At 2,981m, it is the highest point in the Tanzania's Southern Highlands. After 4 days of very steep climbs, rain, very little food ("Who bought lunch???!!") and very unstable camping ground, the team made it to the top and they couldn't have been happier! Until, they remembered they had to walk back down again! Hannah was more positive: "I really enjoyed the trek but the vibe seemed to be everyone was miserable!" It is believed the team were just grumpy because the teachers beat them to the top J

After three weeks of intense walking, wild camping, painting and cooking, it was time to RELAX. What better way than going on a two day Safari at Ruaha National Park? The team spotted, lions, elephants, hippos, giraffes and warthogs. Not to mention herds upon herds of impalas and kudus. Everyone was so surprised at how close the animals were and it was hard to contain excitement and not scream! Next it was off to the beach – Kipepeo Beach Resort on the Swahili Coast. This was utter luxury! Hannah noted, "This seemed to be the time we bonded with the Peterhead pupils the most. It seems strange after spending so much time with them already but this was the time we could enjoy being ourselves and not worry about who is cooking that day or what time we need to be somewhere." Being able to eat burgers, ice-cream, even bacon and pancakes for breakfast was bliss! Kelsie said, "After cooking for ourselves and struggling with a constant diet of porridge, beans and rice, it made eating out so much more exciting." Staying in hut on the beach instead of hard ground was great. Although the rascals decided to toilet paper the leaders' huts on the last night! I'm sure they all enjoyed the 6am wake-up call to clear up J

And then, all of a sudden, it was time to go home. The long, long journey back to Scotland. The four weeks passed so quickly but there are so many memories crammed in, it will be a very long time before anyone forgets this unique experience. Kelsie said, "Although parts of the Expedition were hard, the laughs we had together, making new friends and seeing and experience things I never thought I would, make it all worth it."

Computing

Bentley Systems (formerly C3Global) hosted 6 senior Computing Science students on a week's work experience during

the school summer holidays. This was a very worthwhile experience for all the pupils and very much appreciated by all who attended.

Mrs Grieve (Computing Science Teacher)

Claire Matheson (AH Computing Science) describes what was covered during her Work Experience week with Bentley Systems offices in Dingwall.



On the first day we were shown around the server room and saw where the landline office phones connect. We each had to connect up our own phone. Later we were given instructions about installing amulet and tomcat, programs the office use, and had to work as a team and follow them. We were exposed to the SQL environment and shown basic coding which we were then left to practice on our own. We managed to create our own database tables and add data to them. We were told about how you connect a database to a webpage using Java. We learned the difference between Java and JavaScript.

The next morning we had a Skype call with one of the workers in Manchester who showed us around the amulet website and about the main product of the company. Then we were given an image of a webpage and had to recreate the website using html and CSS. The next day we were shown the existing c3global demo page and were asked to try and redesign the demo page to look like a Bentley webpage. We each designed our own page. On the final day we were given a talk from Richard about the marketing side of Bentley. We were told about how the company used Gartner to expose itself to more businesses and that they used success stories such as Australian Water to boost their image.

Overall it was a great experience to be in the office environment and see all the different jobs there were for the one product.

Paul Langdale (AH Computing Science) comments on the experience

Overall I found the trip very worthwhile as it showed me what an office workplace could be like to work in. I found that I might like to do this as a job as it is very satisfactory and you get to work with some very likeable people.

Zack Benzie (Higher Computing Science) comments on the experience

I feel that the work experience was useful in seeing what it would be like to work in an office environment and I found that I learnt new information on HTML as well as CSS which are both languages used in creating and refining websites respectively. We created two websites; a mock Dingwall Academy home page from a design given to us, and a portal page which we designed ourselves. The atmosphere in the office itself was quite friendly and you could pursue the path according to what it was you were interested in learning and you were given the freedom to work at your own pace. Overall the week of experience was definitely worth it and I am happy to have had the chance to take part.

Greg McCormick (Higher Computing Science) comments on the experience

I feel that the work experience went well overall, we got a look and feel tour of their product and got shown some SQL on it. We also got to get a feel of what it is like to be in an office environment, which was quite different to what I expected which was good. Overall it was a good experience and I feel it was helpful for getting a feel for working in an
