Option Choices

During next term S2, S3, S4 and S5 pupils are all required to make option choices. This is obviously a very important time and advice will be available from a variety of sources. Options forms and option handbooks will be available in both paper form and electronically. Guidance teachers and classroom teachers will all be able to provide further advice and support. Parents are encouraged to contact the school if they have any questions or concerns.



S2 Pupils

S2 pupils are asked to choose 9 subjects for next year. This will include English, Maths and then 7 subjects from the curriculum areas.

S2 into S3 options forms will be issued in March.

S3 Pupils

S3 pupils are asked to choose 6 subjects for next year. These are the subjects pupils will be presented for in the exams at the end of S4.

S3 into S4 option forms will be issued in January.

S4 and S5 Pupils

Senior Phase pupils are asked to choose 4, 5 or 6 subjects depending on the level of study.

Senior Phase options forms will be issued in February.


Chromebooks

Parents may already be aware of the plan to issue all Highland Council pupils with Chromebooks. These are portable devices that pupils will be able to use both in school and at home. Pupils will have full responsibility for these devices and more information will be made available to parents in the New Year. We hope to take delivery of the Chrome books during next term. We also plan to hold an information evening for parents where you will be able to get hands on experience of how the Chromebooks can support learning.



Advanced Higher Computing Science

As part of the Advanced Higher Computing Science course each pupil has to design and develop a project either as a web based database or a computer program. Gerry Carroll and Owen Cochrane, who are both Project Managers in the IT department at Lifescan Inverness, gave a very informative presentation on the need for good project management. They then took time to listen to each of the pupils' project ideas quizzing them about how they are going to tackle their projects and what the scope and boundaries of their projects will be. Gerry and Owen will keep in touch with the pupils over the coming term monitoring their progress and advising them as necessary.



Hour of Code



At the beginning of December many S1, S2 and S3 pupils took part in the International Hour of Code week. This is an opportunity for pupils to 'have a go' at

computer coding. It is organised by Code.org and endorsed by many influential people around the world - most President notably Obama and David Cameron. **Pupils** enjoyed working on the many different coding tutorials, learning the basics of computational thinking and programming in languages such as scratch and JavaScript

Advanced Higher Biology – Aberdeen University Practical Day

Early on Thursday 17th, November a small group students, myself included, studying Advanced Higher Biology



were accompanied by two teachers on a trip to Aberdeen University arriving later in the morning. Upon entering the university you are greeted by the bones of great creatures, long deceased to this backdrop we were registered by a member of university staff, ready to take part in the experiments prepared for us. Our small group, along with other classes from around the Highlands were led to a lab where were given a brief introduction into the real world applications of the experiments that we were about to do. The experiment was split up into three sections with each taking approximately

an hour to complete. The experiments were designed to test the potentiality of regular household products as a medicine. They were put through the three tests: one a pH screening; another, a protein folding test; and the last, an enzyme inhibition test. Between the second and last tests we had a break for lunch after which we were given an illuminating lecture on protein structures before carrying on with the last part of the experiments; when the experiments were completed we collated our results, choosing the product that best filled the requirements of the medicine. When all was completed we started back home, making a small stop at McDonalds to refuel and discuss what we had learned and experienced.



HIGHLAND WILDLIFE PARK, BUSINESS TRIP

On the 24th of November, Mrs Calder and Mrs Mackie's National 4/5 Business Management classes took a day trip to the Highland Wildlife Park in order to learn about the day to day running of the business. The aim of this trip was to collect as much information about the business as possible in order to help us complete our assignments.

During the trip, Jasper, the Education Officer, showed us around the park and spoke a bit about the animals but more importantly, about the running of the organisation. We feel we have gained an increased amount of knowledge not only about the animals, but about how the



Highland Wildlife Park operates. We learnt about the marketing, human resources, finances and also how external factors (such as the environment) can influence the Highland Wildlife Park. For example, the Highland Wildlife Park can only accommodate animals that can survive in colder climates, because of the chilly Scottish weather.

Our teachers also set us a competition that involved taking pictures of the animals we saw, with the best picture winning a prize. The winners were Jennifer Maciver (1st prize), Maya Duffy (2nd prize) and Josh McAllister (3rd prize). Prizes were memorabilia from the Highland Wildlife Park.

National 4/5 Computing Science Building a PC Workshop at UHI Inverness


