### **Dingwall Academy wins National Award**



### Off to Glasgow

We travelled down on a bus to Glasgow to stay in a hostel overnight. En route to the hostel we had our first cultural activity, a visit to the Kelpies, two spectacular thirtymetre high statues of horses on the outskirts of Falkirk. After our tour inside one of the Kelpies, we stopped by the Falkirk Wheel and Mrs Trimble explained to us how it operates. Once we had checked into the hostel we went out into the city centre and our first stop was Zizzi's for dinner. Later that evening we went to see the new Avengers film, *Age of Ultron,* which was great, although I'm not so sure the teachers agreed!

The following day we got up, made ourselves breakfast and split into two groups for our morning activities. Mrs Maclennan and Mr Brindle took one group to the Royal Conservatoire of Scotland, with the other group going to Kelvingrove Art Gallery & Museum with Mrs Trimble, Mrs Slaven and Miss Pendlebury. The group who visited the Conservatoire had a tour of the world class facilities for people studying music, drama, dance, film and production and even got to sit in on an orchestral rehearsal. My group, who went to Kelvingrove, had a fascinating couple of hours wandering around the museum looking at all of the exhibits, and a particular highlight was the painting 'Christ of St John of the Cross' by Salvador Dali. Once we had finished with our morning activities we went shopping on Buchanan Street, one of the main streets for shopping in Glasgow.

## Health Week

As part of Health Week, Amber Dance, Ben Gillan, Cailin Reid and I were invited to visit Tarradale Primary school to educate the youngsters from P1 – P7 on food health and to give small cooking demonstrations. We delivered a small PowerPoint and talked to the pupils about the "Eatwell Food Plate" to show how this contributes to a healthy lifestyle. We were mainly focusing our information on foods that are particularly beneficial for the developing body and to help prepare them for their Sports Day the following day.

We made a selection of dishes for the children including: Tomato, Feta, Mackerel Panini; cold pasta salad; strawberry and banana smoothie, and finally carrot and apple juice. We were able to interact with the children to find out what they liked to eat at home as well as informing them about the ingredients we were using in the recipes and the cooking techniques used to produce each dish. This also gave us a chance to invite a number of pupils to get them involved with some hands on food preparation and cooking.



Many of the children had never tried some of the foods we were using so we were able to encourage them to taste new ingredients to help make their food choices a bit more varied and nutritious.

The Stone Masons, from Elgin College, demonstrated the necessary skills and techniques and also talked to pupils about the career possibilities and degree course training available at Elgin College in Stone Masonry.

The pupils were then invited to try out the techniques on a limestone brick, carving a logo design they had created using their own initials. All pupils worked exceptionally hard and should be proud of the very impressive final results.

The Art & Design department intend to use these stones as the starting point for a Land Art project in the

## **Employability Pilot**



During study leave a number of pupils were involved in an Employability Pilot also included pupils Invergordon Academy and Tain Royal Academy. The programme gave pupils an insight into the world of work and equipped them with the skills necessary to create a CV, apply for work and to conduct a successful interview. The programme included input from Lifescan, SSE, Capgemini, HIAL and Tesco employers and Skills Development Scotland and UHI as Education partners. All pupils carried out one or two weeks of work experience and should gain an ASDAN Employability award. The school would

like to thank all those who contributed to the very successful pilot. Every contributor to the programme praised the pupils who were all totally committed and enthusiastic about the work.

## **S1 Stompers**

At the end of May, those S1 pupils who had completed the Stompers ID unit over the year had a great walk up Fyrish Hill to make use of their newfound skills. ## **Professor Turner Returns**

Two Full Packed Sessions with Professor Turner

On Thursday 18<sup>th</sup> and Friday 19<sup>th</sup> June, the school welcomed back Professor Graham Turner (Chair of Translating and Interpreting Studies at Heriot Watt University).

Last month, it was announced that Professor Turner had won the Principal's Public engagement prize principally around his work with the Deaf community and the BSL Bill. He was well placed to update the pupils, the staff and parents on the journey this Bill is taking. The third and final stage will be sometime in September. The pupils were perhaps slightly disappointed when he told them that the Bill did not specifically mentioned qualifications in BSL. However, he told the pupils that the most important part of the Bill is the word 'promote' BSL. As a result he strongly suspects that there will be qualifications and more job opportunities arising from the need to address the lack of qualifications in BSL and also in the shortages in interpreters and translators.

On Thursday he worked with deaf pupils and BSL learners and the staff from the deaf base, updating them on the BSL Bill. Then in his true style he had everyone engaged in a spot of Chinese whispers but using BSL. Attention to detail and some clever repetition produced the best results. A challenge has been thrown to the pupils: Word Wizard competition 2016 will have BSL as one of the languages. He asked 'Is Dingwall Academy ready to take up this challenge?'

Later in the afternoon he met with several parents to discuss the BSL Bill and BSL qualifications.





On Friday he worked with the entire S3 pupils and staff from the languages department, exploring the reasons and purpose for studying languages.

He started each session with the top ten reasons why we should study languages before the groups were divided into different workshops. Pupil engagement was evident throughout each workshop with much reasoning and explanations going on throughout each workshop.

To finish the session he had the groups repeating Swedish numbers from 1 to 10. Mrs Cormack challenged the group to find any pupil who could recite the Swedish numbers from 1 to 10. It came as no surprise when a number successfully repeated the numbers. Well done to S3!

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## **BFI Film Academy**
