Each session will last approximately 1 hour and aim to answer some of the key questions parents have about the Chrome Books.


#### **GOOGLE CLASSROOM**

#### NATIONAL ACTION PLAN FOR BRITISH SIGN LANGUAGE (SCOTLAND) ACT

Congratulations to Lucy Taylor S2 for her commitment and work with the National Deaf Children's Society (NDCS) in contributing to the National Plan for the BSL (Scotland) Act. Lucy was one of the NDCS young campaigners who met with other young Deaf people across Scotland in the Glasgow offices of the NDCS (Scotland) She said she found the engagement days really interesting. 'It really made me think about how little changes could help make life for Deaf people like me that bit easier'.

Unlike her hearing peers, Lucy has to rely on her cochlear implant and BSL to access everyday life. Travelling independently can be challenging; she might hear the bing bong of the announcement on the train but not hear the actual words spoken and there are no lips to lipread on a tannoy!

She believes, like several of her hearing peers, there should be a national qualification in BSL. Her contributions to the national action plan will hopefully result in SQA qualifications in BSL. Watch this space! The Scottish Government launched the first ever BSL National Plan which sets out how the language should be promoted across Scotland over the next 6 years. Local plans must also be created by October 2018. Dingwall Academy has played its part in this plan when it was going through the various stages; the young people got involved and shared their views in writing and in BSL cumulating in an invitation to attend the final debate.




### **BSL Education App Launch**

It was a very early start (5am!) for Lucy Taylor, Holly Urquhart, Claire Finlayson and Mrs Kinsman on Tuesday 5<sup>th</sup> September. They had been invited to attend a special launch of the BSL Education App in Dynamic Earth in Edinburgh.

The train left promptly and we found our way to the exit where we found a taxi to take us to Dynamic Earth. There we met other young people from different schools (Windsor Park, Falkirk, St Roch's, Glasgow, Calderside Academy Blantyre and Claypotts Primary Dundee). Holly Urquhart said, 'It was great to meet so many other deaf young people.'

### **BSL Education App Launch**

Lewis, Isla and Abbie introduced the new BSL app and explained how they had been involved in the design and ease of use of the app. We thought the app was very interesting because the signs were clear and easy to understand. There are now over 1300 BSL signs covering topics in Physics, Chemistry, Maths, Biology, Geography and Astronomy. They



showed us films in BSL about different signs and their explanations. Lucy Taylor; studying Biology said this section was 'brilliant' as the signs were clear and so too were the explanations.

The science show was presented by Dr Audrey Cameron, Gary Quinn and Dr Rhian Meara. Both Audrey



and Gary are deaf and use BSL. Rhian was hearing but also presented in BSL. There was also a lady typing what everyone was saying. Her job is an electronic notetaker. There were 2 BSL / English interpreters who either signed or provided voice overs for people who didn't understand the BSL. Claire got to meet one of the lecturers, Dr Gary Quin, from Heriot Watt BSL Interpreting and Translating course. He was full of compliments about the two students from Dingwall Academy who are currently studying there and asked if she was planning to follow them.

Research and feedback from schools, young people and

teachers have suggested that not only is this app excellent for Deaf learners but hearing learners like the clear explanations too!

During the science show they taught us different signs for glaciers, volcanoes and clouds etc. Rhian showed us a practical experiment with slime and rocks to show us how a glacier is formed. Gary showed us a practical experiment to show how a tsunami works. It didn't work the first time and the houses were not destroyed. Gary had to add more water for the experiment to work. Audrey showed us a model of a volcano and as they were explaining how it works there was a sudden explosion of lemonade. The whole front row was soaked.

We also got a chance to see around Dynamic Earth; it was sometimes difficult to see and to hear what was going on. We don't think this place is very deaf aware. We then had to head back for our train home. Unfortunately, the train broke down so we had to wait for another train. It was a very long day but it was fantastic. The BSL Education app is excellent.
