# **QUALITY IMPROVEMENT VISIT**

On 27<sup>th</sup> and 28<sup>th</sup> September the school welcomed visitors from the authority Quality Improvement team. The team had been invited into school as part of the school's self-evaluation process. During the 2 days the team observed classes and spoke to pupil, staff and parent groups. The team identified some areas requiring attention but in general were very pleased with what they saw. They found the attitude and behaviour of the majority of pupils to be very good and in particular were very impressed by the standards set by senior pupils.

### **S4 STUDY SKILLS**

During the 12<sup>th</sup> and 13th November all S4 pupils will be given the opportunity to take part in a seminar with the Tree of Knowledge Company. Pupils will be given advice and support as they move towards their prelim examinations. Pupils will also be asked to reflect on their progress in subjects and to set targets for their prelim exams. On 12<sup>th</sup> November at 7pm there will be an information session for S4 parents. This session will outline what pupils have worked at during the day and will also provide some advice on how parents can help pupils study and prepare for exams.

# **S5 S6 UNIT ASSESSMENTS**

All pupils following Intermediate, Higher or Advanced Higher courses have to complete and pass a number of unit assessments – pupils will often refer to these as NABs. Where possible, the dates of unit assessments will be detailed on the website. However pupils must also take note of dates from teachers and be responsible for knowing when these important assessments will take place. Unit assessments are an essential part of the course and must be passed if pupils are to achieve an overall course award.

### SPONSORED WALK

On the last day of term over 800 pupils and staff took part in the sponsored walk with 80 senior pupils helping to marshal the route. After the terrible rain we were fortunate to have a very pleasant Autumn day which helped keep the spirits up as pupils covered the 10 mile course. The school are grateful to members of the parent council who helped distribute much appreciated water and chocolate at the midway point. # LA TRAVIATA

S5 and 6 senior music students recently enjoyed a fantastic La Traviata workshop from Scottish Opera, prior to seeing the final live performance at the Strathpeffer Pavilion on Thursday 4<sup>th</sup> October. Erin Haslam 5N describes the experience: this had been her first experience of opera and she would certainly go back to see another.

She explains that "La Traviata" is a very sad and moving opera. Act one begins with the female lead Violetta hosting a party as she is a courtesan. Alfredo is a photographer who is madly in love with Violetta and tells her of his love. Three months later Violetta and Alfredo move in together. Alfredo's father then visits, telling Violetta to give up Alfredo and spare his family the shame. Violetta leaves and Alfredo is so

distraught he goes to find her. When he does find her he is too late and she is dying. Act three closes with Violetta dying. This opera was my first and I would certainly go back to see another. The Scottish Opera's take on Verdi's "La Traviata" was unbelievable. The music and singing were impeccable and when I met the cast afterwards they were genuinely nice people. I would definitely go back to see the Scottish Opera again.
