
They told us about the classes, bus, school work, uniform and making friends. Then we were allowed to ask many questions and they would answer them.

After eating food, each shelter was show-cased by their team – luckily we didn't have time to test them with buckets of water!




We drew some nets of cubes and cuboids, looked at which sides had to match up and where to put the tabs so we could glue them.




When we came in the next day we had not one, but two minions on our jotter cupboard door! We really liked the finished model and it looks great as our cupboard logo.

Geology Trip Rocks


We know what you're thinking; just how interesting can rocks be? We went to Knockan Crag to find out. Knockan Crag is a line of cliffs thirteen miles north of Ullapool, to an area where the Moine thrust fault is exposed.



The next location we went to had a strange looking rock that was mostly red with little white polka dots on the top and columns down the side. The polka dots and columns were really old, fossilized worm burrows (pictured right).

The Moine thrust fault is where, millions of years ago, two of the Earth's tectonic plates crashed into each other and forced older rock on top of younger rock. There is a five million year age difference between the two rock types. What makes Knockan Crag really interesting is that it was the first thrust fault in the world to be discovered and contributed evidence to the theory of plate tectonics. Katie seemed more interested in the moss than the rock, however.

There are several rock faces that have been exposed due to road building, so we decided to have a look at them... and dump hydrochloric acid on them, much to Danielle's delight. If the rock contained a mineral called calcite, it would fizz and smell like rotten eggs. Lovely.



We went to a quarry to hunt for fossils. It was mostly full of rocks, but we came across a trilobite – an extinct marine creature that looks like a giant woodlouse (pictured left).



In conclusion – our geology trip ROCKED!
