### **Evanton Pupils**

Parents and Guardians of Evanton pupils may be interested to know that Stagecoach offer a significant cost reduction for pupils with the option of a Scholar season ticket. This ticket can only be used once daily during regular school hours but gives a reduction of approximately 75% in fares. These tickets can be bought direct from Farraline bus station, Inverness.

#### The Bells ...

We are currently trialling no bells between class periods. The bell now only rings at the start of the day and at the end of interval and lunchtime. Pupils and staff have commented on how this reduces pressure in corridors. It also asks pupils to take responsibility for ensuring that they move onto their next class in time. This will be reviewed at the end of study leave.

#### Leadership

Senior Pupils at Dingwall Academy have always been given the opportunity to develop their leadership skills through prefects, buddying etc. We are now working to offer younger pupils the opportunity to develop their leadership skills.

#### **Parent Council Bake Sale**

Parent Council together with the DiGGers gardening group are holding a Bake Sale at morning interval on Friday 7<sup>th</sup> June. Donation of baking will be welcome on the day and proceeds of the sale will go to the gardening group.

#### **Super Citizen Scheme**

Pupils in S2 have been invited to apply for the position of 'Super Citizens'. They are learning how to fill in an application form and have discussed why they feel they are responsible citizens. They have given up to date examples of when they are good role-models at school, home and in the wider community. The successful applicants will be given responsibilities during the P7-S1 transition. These duties will range from guiding P7 pupils around the school to helping out with friendship games in PSE classes. In addition to this a few of the smaller feeder primary schools will be invited in to the academy prior to the three day visit for an afternoon of informal chatting with our Super Citizens. We will provide them with juice and biscuits, some helpful advice and very warm welcome to Dingwall Academy.

#### **S3 Prefects**

S3 pupils (now S4) were given the opportunity to apply to be prefects during the study leave period. Pupils were asked to complete application forms that included a staff reference. The response to this was excellent with 100 pupils submitting applications. There were many more applications than places with the standard of application extremely high. 40 prefects have now received training and started their prefect duties.

#### **Young Enterprise**

On Thursday, 25th April, 6 S6 pupils took part in the annual Young Enterprise Scotland Awards at The Ironworks Venue in Inverness. As part of the ASDAN Award and Young Enterprise Scotland scheme, the group started their own business, Candy Candles where they sold sweet scented candles to the public and throughout the school. The group thoroughly enjoyed the experience and at the Awards ceremony they were presented with a "Highly Commended" award for their Marketing. Particular praise was given to the group's use of Social Media to promote their business.

### **Activity Days**

Activity Days take place on Tuesday 25<sup>th</sup> and Wednesday 26<sup>th</sup> June. The lists showing activities pupils are involved in have been pinned up in school and pupils have met with the staff leading each activity. A small number of pupils have still to pay the final balance for activities and are asked to bring this to the office as soon as possible.

#### **Alladale**

The Alladale Challenge has been organised by the Alladale Estate to raise awareness about our natural heritage and the working of an estate. The owner of the Alladale Estate is trying to replant the Caledonian Forest which once covered large areas of Scotland; he is also reintroducing the wildlife that would have lived in the forest. While there the pupils taking part will help in the conservation efforts and will have the chance to see the animals being reintroduced and help the rangers in charge of their wellbeing. Pupils there will also take part in activities overseen by trained individuals to maintain their safety; it's not all work.

I was part of the group leaving on the first week of Monday 25<sup>th</sup> of April. Within the group we were split up into two teams, Team A and Team B. Our bags were loaded on to the van that would follow that coach we were taken to Alladale. While going to Alladale we met up with our team leaders and got the food that we would need for the week camping. When we got to the lodge the team split up and we organised the food and other supplies that we would need for the week. That day we simply familiarised ourselves with the area and set up our tents. The activities started the next day.

The activities that we took part in around the estate were gorge walking, some conservation work, wild camping and a safari run of the animals being reintroduced. The gorge walking activity saw us climbing up wet rocks, wading through water and near the end a small waterfall with the help of a safety rope and harness, our team leader and another trained individual were there as well to ensure our safety during the event. For the conservation work the two teams did different activities, Team A (my team) helped in the removal of the plastic guards from around the young trees that had been planted; I'm afraid I can't say for sure what Team B did but there was a lot of talk about herding cattle. The safari run took place after our conservation work and we were taken around the different animals being introduced, those animals I shall name here – the European elk, European bison, and wildcats of which they have around three of each. Throughout the week there was the constant activity of walking several kilometres in a single day and setting up tents. Our day of wild camping had us walk about 5km to a loch and setting up our tents, after the tents were set up it was decided who would cook as it was every day and later on we made a campfire from bits of wood we could find from the old forest which could be found next to the loch. Another camping location was the badger hide, a small room built in the side of a hill with a log burner and a table, and it was here at least that Team A told ghost stories, the best coming from Miss Tullis.

The weather while we were there although dreadful on the first day lightened up during the week and it was mostly dry and sunny while we were walking and setting up our tents although the wind picked up sometimes, the best nights were the ones spent warm and dry in your sleeping bag while the wind howled outside and the rain bettered against your tent. The only day when the weather was really bad was the Thursday night when the wind was so powerful that it was actually blowing away some of the tents, although not far. The rain that night was also terrible coming down. The night though was not totally terrible as the team leaders and the other adults present made venison burgers and we had a barbeque. As for sleeping the boys all slept in one room of the lodge, the girls in the other the team reunited at the end of the week.

It was the perfect way to spend the week and I would like to thank Miss Tullis, Mr Lyall (the teachers from our academy on the trip), the people that kept us safe during the week, and most of all I would like to thank the owner of the Alladale Estate for allowing us to be there.

### **Rugby Hits Dingwall Academy!**

Since March John Mann, Ross Sutherland RFC rugby development coach, has been coaching a group of S1 and S2 boys on a Wednesday after school. This meant that Dingwall were able to enter the recent S1 and S2 rugby sevens tournaments held at the Ross Sutherlands ground in Invergordon.

With many of our pupils having just started rugby the tournament was designed to develop our players and give them an opportunity to play competitive matches. In the S2 tournament the boys were up against four other teams. Considering only 2 of the squad of 10 had played before the boys did tremendously well to come away with two wins

against Invergordon and Golspie Barbarians. However, we also managed to score the most tries, five in total, against the eventual tournament winners Tain, who had many experienced rugby players in their ranks. All the boys played extremely well, however, a special mention goes out to Brandon MacPhee who was voted Dingwall's MVP for the quality and ferocity of his tackling. The next week it was the S1's turn to experience competitive rugby. Four of the boys had already played in the S2 tournament the week before, meaning they were slightly more experienced than the previous week. However, they were joined by three boys who had attended training



the previous week for the first time! As the first game started it was clear that the Dingwall team were naturals and had so much pace, power and skill that Alness Academy simply couldn't match them. Having wrapped up their first win Dingwall played Tain RA who also struggled to keep our boys at bay. Many tries were run in with the boys really starting to gel as a team. The last game was against an experienced Fortrose Academy side that included four Highland RFC players. However, within 30 seconds the Dingwall boys showed there class with the first try. The game was tight after that but Dingwall stuck to the task and outscored Fortrose by five tries to two. This was a fantastic result and meant that Dingwall were presented with the MF Marine Shield. It was hard to pick out the MVP from an



outstanding group of players but Owen Fraser was picked for his tremendous work rate, pace and power. Well done to all boys involved in both tournaments. I hope to see Rugby build on this success and grow in Dingwall over the next session. Practice continues to take place for S1 and S2 boys on a Wednesday after school until 5pm. ### **Cross Country and Athletics Round Up**

### **Inter house Cross Country 2013**

The inter house cross country championships was held in February this year. A cold day was in store for the runners but this did not stop 125 boys and girls from S1-S3 from competing to the best of their ability. All pupils that entered earned a point for their house with the most successful house team in each race winning 50pts, second place team 40pts, third place team 30pts, fourth place team 20pts down to 10pts for the fifth place team. All races were extremely keenly contested, although none more so than the S1 boys race where Scott MacDonald and Joe Arnaud vied all the way for the top spot, with Scott finally taking the win. This would continue to be a healthy rivalry that would continue throughout the Cross Country season.

On what was another extremely cold day, which seems to be par for the course with cross country competitions, Dingwall Academy pupils set out with the aim of trying win the team competition for each age group. However, there was also the attraction of individual positions that were up for grabs and Dingwall Academy runners did not disappoint. Scott MacDonald and Joe Arnaud continued their rivalry in the first years boys race. This time Joe took the gold with Scott taking the silver just behind him. A special mention must go to the S1 boys team who along with Joe and Scott's 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> race finishes they also took 4<sup>th</sup>, 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> in the race. There were also individual medals for Erin Robinson – S1 Girls Silver, Lauren Fraser – Senior Girls Gold and Sean Chalmers – Senior Boys Gold.

However, the team events as always are a little bit special as it takes a collective effort from all pupils running. Presentation time approached and as the Head of PE from Alness Academy continued to read out the results Dingwall couldn't stop winning. S1 boys (lowest score of the day), S1 Girls, U15 Boys, U15 girls and Senior girls team event wins all came Dingwall's way. However, the senior boys had a very close battle with Tain Royal Academy and we knew it was going to be close...... and it was!! ### **North Schools Cross Country Championships**

After a successful Ross-Shire Schools Cross Country championship Dingwall runners were looking forward to challenging themselves at what would be a significantly higher level of competition. Erin Robinson was fourth in the S1 girls race and Joe Arnaud and Scott MacDonald again took a fantastic, one – two, in the S1 boys race.

In the team events there were again some excellent results. The S1 girls and U15 boys came second in their respective races with the senior girls picking up a creditable third place overall. However, once again it was those spritely S1 boys who stole all the headlines with a runaway win in the team event!! Along with Joe and and Scott's

1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> place, Tam Munro Whyte and Niall Maclelland also finished in 8<sup>th</sup> and 9<sup>th</sup> place respectively. Four pupils from the same school finishing in the top ten is a very rare occurrence and it was no surprise that the boys combined score of 20pts was the lowest overall score of the day by some margin – a magnificent achievement.
